### **340B: Preparing for Audit and Centralized Distribution Plans**

More and more STD programs are receiving 340b audits. Is your program prepared? What can you learn from other programs who have received an audit to be better prepared? Additionally, many STD programs are running central distribution in their 340b program—when a state or city STD entity purchases medication and provides it to other 340b entities in their jurisdiction, such as county health departments. And while these models are not unusual for public health, is not a common model in general in the 340B Program. This session will also cover how to correctly set up a STD Central Distribution model for the distribution of 340b-purchased medication.

### **Reimagining DIS Training, Quality Improvement, and Success**

As DIS roles adapt to an ever-evolving STD prevention landscape, it is imperative that DIS training and evaluation also evolve with the times. This interactive workshop will focus on ways that various areas around the country have re-imagined DIS training, re-examined quality improvement processes and evaluation metrics, and re-defined the meaning of “success.” Participants will leave with skills on how to identify training needs and other opportunities for continued development of the DIS workforce beyond Passport to Partner Services.

### **Hot Topics in STD Surveillance: Congenital Syphilis, Making the Transition from NETSS to MMG, and Proposed Changes for Reporting LGV**

Investigating and reporting cases of congenital syphilis is challenging and complex. This session will provide attendees with key questions and information to collect when determining case status of moms and infants. Workshop participants will apply what they have learned through facilitator-led, small-group discussion of 5-6 case studies and will conclude by reviewing several frequently asked questions regarding the CDC Congenital Syphilis Case Report form. Additionally, participants will: learn about challenges their STD Surveillance Program may face and best practices for making a smooth transition from NETSS to MMG for STD Case Reporting to CDC; and learn about and provide feedback to CDC and CSTE staff on proposed changes for case reporting of LGV.
